#### WHAT IS DIA DE LOS MUERTOS?

The Day of the Dead, known as "Día de los Muertos" in Spanish, is a Mexican holiday that celebrates, and honors deceased loved ones. It is a unique blend of Indigenous traditions and Catholicism and is observed primarily on November 1st and 2nd, corresponding with the Catholic holidays of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

During the Day of the Dead, families come together to remember and pay homage to their deceased relatives and friends. It's a festive occasion that involves creating altars, or "ofrendas," adorned with photographs of the deceased, their favorite foods, drinks, and other personal items. The idea behind these altars is to welcome the spirits of the departed back to the world of the living for a brief reunion.

The holiday is known for vibrant and colorful decorations like sugar skulls, marigold flowers, and decorative skeletons. People visit cemeteries to clean and decorate graves, leave offerings, and reflect.

Day of the Dead is a joyful and respectful celebration of the cycle of life and death, where families come together to remember those who have passed away. It is celebrated worldwide with adaptations that blend local traditions.

"La Catrina," created by Mexican illustrator José Guadalupe Posada in the early 20th century, is an iconic symbol of Día de los Muertos. It depicts a skeletal figure dressed in elegant attire, originally intended to satirize Mexican elites and remind them of the universal equality in death.

Over time, La Catrina has evolved into a beloved symbol of the holiday, embodying the festive and respectful nature of Día de los Muertos. Diego Rivera immortalized La Catrina by giving her a full body for the first time in his famous mural "Dream of a Sunday Afternoon in the Alameda Central."

In this painting, La Catrina is depicted holding hands with a young Rivera and standing next to Posada, symbolizing her integration into Mexican culture and art. Rivera's portrayal further solidified La Catrina's status as a central figure in Día de los Muertos celebrations, serving as a reminder of the holiday's themes of remembrance and the celebration of life.

#### Goals

This event achieves several goals, including raising funds and awareness for Casa Círculo Cultural's daily cultural activities, preserving and promoting Latin culture, and sharing the significance of this special tradition with the community.





## EVENT BACKGROUND

The Dia de los Muertos Celebration in Redwood City began in 2011 at the plaza located in front of the city's Public Library. During its first year, the event was relatively small, with an approximate attendance of 200 community members throughout the evening. By the third year, the event had grown significantly, and the crowds had become so large that it had to be relocated to Courthouse Square – a popular outdoor area in Redwood City. Today, the Dia de los Muertos Celebration attracts thousands of visitors from across the Bay Area and worldwide.

Seven streets around Courthouse Square have been closed to facilitate the influx of visitors, vendor booths, and activities. Local artists, dancers, and singers take the stage to showcase their talents during the event.





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### CELEBRATANG AN REDWOOD CATY

Courthouse Square is transformed into a lively space that showcases musicians, dancers, artists, family altars, and more to visitors. The square is decorated with sugar skulls and marigolds, which adds to its vibrancy. Visitors can also witness Catrinas walking around, greeting the community. In the Food Court area, papel picado is used to decorate, and visitors can try various traditional foods. The San Mateo County History Museum has an exhibition of altars. It hosts free arts and crafts activities for kids, which allows them to create traditional art and engage in hands-on activities. This modest celebration of Mexican culture has become one of Redwood City's most prominent events.
